

The Greensboro Symphony Guild is pleased to host the annual conference (known as the Roundtable) of the Southeastern Orchestra Volunteer Association (SOVA). Our theme is Gateway to Greatness Greensboro, and co-chairs **Linda Hiatt** and **Frances Vinoski**, working with the SOVA board, have planned a stellar lineup of speakers and events. October 8-9, 2018, is the date and the location is the lovely O'Henry Hotel.

The impressive lineup of speakers for the conference includes:

Rich Schlentz, a leadership coach and author, will be giving us ideas about developing strategies to increase volunteer engagement, commitment and productivity. His debut book is *Your Employees Have Quit – They Just Haven't Left*. Rich will be speaking about how to build a highly engaged volunteer guild (or association) while maintaining your sanity.

Music Education is Our Mission

In each Guild Horn this year, we will focus on one of the ten GSO education programs. Our Guild members help to make these programs possible through their generous donations of time and treasure.

During its 54-year history, the Guild has served the GSO in many ways. You may not know however, that since 2014, 100% of the funds the Guild raises each year are earmarked specifically for music education. While most of us are familiar with Music in the Middle and our Elementary School Concerts, the Guild also provides significant funding for eight other programs that are vital to music enrichment in our community. Under the guidance of the GSO's dynamic Education Director Peter Zlotnick, Guild funds help bring music education into the lives of citizens of all ages in Guilford and surrounding counties.

Focus on the GSYO—47 Years of Success

Since 1971, youth musicians have been able to participate in their own orchestra under the mentorship of professional instructors and conductors. Our Youth Orchestra Program has expanded to include three different levels; the Youth Camerata (a string ensemble for 30+ intermediate-level musicians), the Youth Philharmonic (a string ensemble for 40+ advanced-level musicians) and the Greensboro Symphony

Youth Orchestra (a full orchestra with strings, woodwinds, brass, and percussion for 65+ highly advanced young musicians). Through this program, students from as far away as Chapel Hill and southern Virginia hone their musicianship while polishing their performance skills. They experience the thrill of performing before an audience at Sunday afternoon concerts in November, March, and May each year. Parents, friends, and an appreciative group of Guild members are always in the audience for these impressive free concerts.

For their performance last May, the GSYO presented their first **"Side-by-Side"** Concert, during which the youth musicians played beside 30 GSO musicians. This experience provided a unique opportunity for the students to practice and play beside their professional mentors. The Side-by-Side Concert was made possible by contributions to the Guild's 2017 Annual Education Campaign.

Evan Feldman heads the program as GSYO Music Director. Conducting the Youth Philharmonic and Youth Camerata are Colleen Chenail and Ryane Dunnagan, assisted by Rachel Watson. The Youth Orchestra program is funded by tuition, but there are many students who would be unable to participate if not for scholarships offered by the Guild. We help fund teacher salaries, youth musician summer camps, and bi-annual regional music-enrichment trips.

Just like their professional counterparts, the youth musicians must audition to earn a place in the orchestra. On September 7, 8, and 9, the students will gather at the UNC-G Music Building to vie for a spot in one of the GSYO ensembles. Guild volunteers **Rosemary Reed, Becky Thomas, Deb Morgan, and Judy Jay** will be there to calm nerves and prepare the students for their turn before the judges. GSYO Auditions will be the first official volunteer activity of the 2018-19 Guild year and we welcome your participation. Please call Rosemary Reed at 282-5809 or Becky Thomas at 587-3991 if you have an hour or two to help on Friday evening from 5-8 pm, Saturday 10 am-3 pm, or Sunday 1-6 pm.

SOTTO VOCE ... Just Between Us

OUR GREENSBORO SYMPHONY MARK HEKMAN, BASSOONIST

A very wise algebra teacher once said, "The answer (destination) is not important; the progression (journey) is."



The journey of a professional musician and bassoonist like Mark Hekman, Doctor of Musical Arts, has been varied and unique. He is still progressing in his musical career. A bassoon player is unique enough.

BASSOON: A woodwind instrument in the double reed family and large cousin of the Oboe. Standing 4ft.5in. tall, its actual sounding length is 8ft.4in., with a range from A1 to A5 (4 octaves). The bassoon is familiar to children worldwide. It identifies as Grandfather in the story "Peter and the Wolf". This instrument also has its humorous side and often portrays a lovable drunk....oh, well. The bassoon requires major breath control.

Mark has major breath control to master this unique instrument. From the age of five, Mark has been a serious cyclist like his dad who is now in his late 70's. Mark's mother played the viola. Therefore, music, as well as cycling, was a major presence in his home. After receiving his Master's from Ohio State University, Mark concentrated on professional cycling for five years. It was the right time to follow an old dream and succeed at it. Then, he returned to UNC-G and worked on his doctorate with Dr. Michael Burns whose wife, Carla, also plays with our Greensboro Symphony.

As of today, Mark's schedule includes teaching at High Point University, giving private lessons as well as performing in cultural events, church services and with visiting professional groups. Mark and his wife have three little girls. He states that "Nothing is expected of me in the house". Of course not.

Final question: "Why do you continue to perform?"

Answer: "For the rewarding experience of playing with and supporting others as well as gaining new insights into great music. It is fun and exhilarating."


